Top Tray Class
87. Association Top Tray is for a display of three vegetables chosen from the following eight. The quantity of each vegetable is shown in brackets:
CARROTS (3)
CAULIFLOWER (2)
ONIONS (3)
PARSNIPS (3)
PEAS (6 Pods)
POTATOES (3)
RUNNER BEANS (6 Pods)
TOMATOES (6)
For carrots and parsnips the top foliage should be trimmed to not more than 3 inches from the top of the shoulder of the vegetable.
The Vegetables should be displayed within an area of $18^{\prime \prime}$ by $24^{\prime \prime}$. All vegetables must be displayed within the confines of this area, and no part of any vegetable may come out of it.
A tray or board measuring $18^{\prime \prime}$ by $24^{\prime \prime}$ can be used on which to display the vegetables or the area can simply be marked out on the staging.
Where a tray has a lip or edge it is the internal measurement that must be no greater then $18^{\prime \prime}$ by $24^{\prime \prime}$.
A black base cloth is permitted, or the tray can be painted. The only garnishing material allowed is parsley. No other material is allowed at all (no plates, sand, onion rings etc)
Judging will be to RHS rules for individual items

1. Wine bottles must be clear, punted, holding approximately 26 fluid ozs. (Bordeaux or lightweight Sauterne type)
2. White plastic topped flanged cork stoppers to be used. Points will be given for general dressing of bottle. Bottom of label to be one inch from base of bottle. Label central between seams.
Horbury and District Allotment Labels only to be used.
3. Wine bottles should be filled so as to allow airspace of $.25^{\prime \prime}$ to $.75^{\prime \prime}$.
4. No fortification of alcohol allowed.
5. Points given for clarity, bouquet, taste and after taste.
6. The competitor's name must not appear on the bottle.

## RULES

1. Classes 1 to 23 inclusive shall be bona-fide growing of the members
2. No exhibitor shall be allowed more than one prize for the same description of article in any one class and shall neither stage more or less articles than the schedule specifies. The committee shall have power to enquire whether items exhibited in all classes are the bona-fide growth of the exhibitor and if not, such exhibitor shall forfeit his entrance money, lose claim on the Association and be excluded from membership thereof.
3. All exhibits at this show shall be bona-fide growing of the exhibitor and not a collection from several gardens. If it is proved that an exhibit is not the bonafide growing of the exhibitor, he shall forfeit his entrance money and prize money and shall be excluded from exhibiting at any future show of the Association. The committee shall have power to visit the garden of any exhibitor either before or after the show.
4. The judges shall have the power to withhold, at their discretion, prizes for inferior articles or where there are insufficient entries.
5. Strict attention must be paid to the number and quality of each article marked in the schedule. Any exhibitor staging more or less will be disqualified in such classes.
6. Entries must be received by 12.15 pm and staging completed by 12.30 pm . Judging will commence at 1.00 pm .
7. Any objection other than on the merit of the awards made by the judges, after the judge's decision is known, shall be made in writing accompanied by a deposit of 15 p, and handed to the secretary not later than 5.00 pm on the day of the show. If the objection is sustained, the deposit will be refunded, otherwise it will be forfeited.
8. All disputes in connection with the show are to be referred to the committee and their decision shall be final. No legal proceedings to be taken.
9. Definition of Amateur: Any person who gains his livelihood by growing for sale or who is employed as a paid gardener or any person who employs whole time labour is not eligible to compete in Amateur Member's Classes.
10. Prize money will be paid on the day of the show from $5.30 \mathrm{pm}-6.30 \mathrm{pm}$.
11. In the event of a tie on points, any trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor with the highest number of first prize awards
12. The show will close at 6.00 pm and remaining exhibits will be used at the Harvest Festival the following evening in the Working Men's Club. VASES AND PLATES WILL BE PROVIDED FOR EXHIBITORS
